


# STAFF SPOTLIGHT MEET OUR STAFF




# STUDENT PRESENTATIONS




# **ASSEMBLY**

As Charles Mackasey said - "How do you make a good mole hill?" " By making lots of bad ones first." said the Mole.




### **HOUSE COMPETITIONS**

Phase 1: at the beginningPhase 2: in the middle


• Phase 3: at the end while working on the projects.

When asked what her favorite part of The Sapien is, she says "When I look at the participants' cameras and I see them smiling or laughing. I'm so grateful for all the new friends I've been able to make through our sessions whom I may never otherwise be able to meet in person!"

Natalie hopes for The Sapien to continue growing in the coming months and for it to be able to reach more students around the world who too may be wishing they could engage with other youth in meaningful and interesting conversations.

You can choose which elements from the IB diploma you would like to study, this is called the IB Course. You can study 4 subjects and the Extended Essay if you like.






#### Year 11 interviews

### Year 12 Extended Essay

All our year 12 IB students have officially begun their Extended Essay project. The extended essay is a 4000 word essay that every IB student must write, it can be about anything they want to research and is a great replica of the university dissertation many will have to do in the future. Each student has now been allocated a supervisor, who will guide them through the extended essay process. The first 1000 words are due at the end of May - here are some examples of topics IB students have chosen to research:



- How does Arthur Miller's Death of a Salesman critique today's capitalist society? The American Dream?
- To what extent does Mindfulness help people cope with General Anxiety Disorder (GAD)?
