
SCIENCE ON FIRE!


MATHS CHALLENGE BOARD





HOUSE POINTS

YEAR 12 HEART DISSECTION

Mr Karim's Year 12 Biology students had an amazing opportunity this week to dissect a real heart. It was wonderful to hear students identify the different parts of the heart including the Vena Cava and the Septum and to talk in great detail about the function of these parts. They demonstrated excellent subject knowledge and understanding of how the heart works.



YEAR 12 PHYSICS

Our Year 12 Physics students have been busy this week investigating the relationship between force and acceleration/ Newton's second law. They negated the effect of friction by slightly tilting the wooden platform and kept the total mass of system constant. They the measured the time it took to travel a measured distance. With this information, they can then calculate acceleration and plot a graph (Force vs acceleration) to show the required relationship.
