
Yoga World Record Prillanam & Guillanam Alinier

An amazing experience and achievement for the boys and their parents who represented France and Mauritius.






SPARTAN Prillanam & Guillanam Alinier



The Alinier brothers have not only been busy breaking World Records but also taking part in the Spartan Race. Keep up the great work boys!






House Competitions


Library Lessons



Our library lessons this month are focusing on two areas:

Providing our students with the tools and skills to manage their library accounts on our library management system (Oliver).

Every student has a library account on Oliver. We demonstrated and introduced students to how to log in and navigate through the drop down menu to carry out many tasks. The idea is to give the students control of their account where they can renew books, know when the borrowed books are due and much more.

...with Autism Spectrum (ASD) needs...

I got my official diagnosis when I was 19 and at university. For years I had been misdiagnosed as having Bipolar Disorder because the awareness of how Autism is shown by girls is so poor. I had been told that I was too smart to have SEN, and that my language was too good and so for most of my primary and high school career I had been written off as 'weird but not needing extra help'.

My biggest challenge with Autism is probably also the thing that makes me best at my job. My husband calls it going 'down the rabbit hole' and it happens involuntarily. What most people see as dedication and willpower is actually most likely to be me lacking the ability to switch off from my current obsession. It usually starts with things I can research, and then can never stop researching. I get obsessed with things that make no real difference to anything (did you know that penguins do, in fact, have knees?), like memorising all the words to a song or knowing everything there is to know about Mallard (A steam train, it's a long story but now I have a double O gauge steam train licence) and as much as I wish I could, I can't channel where this obsessive energy goes.

I have to admit that when I first found out it did answer a lot of things I had questioned over the years. I had always struggled to make small talk with people, in fact if I was ever on public transport I'd speak in a different accent and 'be' a different person just so that I was able to chat like other people seemed to do.

I have to say that now I've learned to live with it. I don't hate it but it has made aspects of my life difficult and it's taken me until I'm almost 30 to feel like I really know how to handle it. I'm not sure I'd choose not to have it now though, I probably would never have got my degree without being a bit obsessed with my subject!
