VOCABULARY

Accomplished: finish something successfully.

Achievement: when something has been accomplished through hard work, courage, or skill.

Activist: someone who is not willing to let a situation go unnoticed.

Ambitious: showing a strong desire and determination to succeed.

Barriers: an obstacle that keeps blocking progress.

Campaign: work in an organized and active way towards a particular goal.

Civil Rights: basic rights that every citizen has under the laws of the government.

Determination: A quality that makes you continue to try to do something even when it is difficult.

Empowered: give (someone) the authority or power to do something.

Freedom: the power or right to act, speak, or think as one wants.

Humanity: all human beings collectively; the quality or condition of being human.

Nobel Prize: an award that honours people anywhere in the world who have done outstanding work.

NEW KNOWLEDGE

1917: The British Women's Land Army was first set up to encourage women to work in agriculture, replacing men called up to the military.



1932: Amelia Earhart became the first woman to fly solo across the Atlantic—as a pilot.



1983: Flying on the Space Shuttle Challenger, Sally Ride becomes the first American woman in space.



2014: Malala Yousafzai was announced as the co-recipient of the 2014 Nobel Peace Prize for the right of all children to education.



1928: Emmeline Pankhurst's work with the Women's Social and Political Union led to the success of the Representation of the People Act, which granted British women the same voting rights as men.

1955: Black seamstress Rosa Parks refuses to give up her seat to a white man on a bus in Montgomery, Ala. The move helps launch the civil rights movement.



2008: Becomes the first African American first lady upon Obama's Election Day victory working on many initiatives throughout the years.



2021: Kamala Harris is sworn in as the first woman and first woman of colour vice president of the United States.



- The Suffragettes campaigned for equal voting rights for women in the early 20th Century.
- Women were imprisoned for campaigning for their rights.
- A Suffragist believed in a peaceful campaign for women's rights whereas a Suffragette was more direct and aggressive for the cause.



The United States Congress has called Rosa Parks "the first lady of civil rights" and "the mother of the freedom movement".



Amelia Earhart became a record-breaking female aviator whose international fame improved public acceptance of aviation and paved the way for other women in commercial flight.
