The boys 1km race kicked off the event, followed by the girls' 1km race and then the boys' 2km race. All the participants successfully completed the routes and had a great time. Although the event was called a "race," the primary focus was to encourage the students to adopt healthy exercise habits, set fitness goals, and promote a sense of personal accomplishment and healthy competition, as well as teamwork and sportsmanship.





Google Classroom - Calendar

With technology playing an increasingly important role in education, many teachers are turning to Google Classroom as a tool for assigning and managing student work. Google Classroom is an online platform that allows teachers to create assignments, organize them, communicate with students, and track their progress.

One of the main benefits of using Google Classroom is that it provides a central location where students can easily access and submit their work. However, as a parent, it can be challenging to keep track of your child's assignments and deadlines on the platform.

To help parents stay up-to-date with their child's school work, it is recommended that they encourage their child to share their Google Classroom calendar with them. By doing so, parents can easily view all upcoming assignments and deadlines without having to log in to the platform each time.

To share the Google Classroom calendar, students simply need to follow these steps:

- Open the Google Calendar app on their device.
- Click on the three horizontal lines in the top left corner to access the menu.
- Scroll down and click on "Settings".
- Scroll down to "Settings for my calendars" and click on the calendar associated with their Google Classroom.
- Click on "Access permissions".
- Scroll down and click on "Add people".
- Enter the email address of the parent they wish to share the calendar with.
- Select the level of access they wish to grant (i.e. view only, make changes, etc.).

Once the calendar has been shared, parents can view all upcoming assignments and deadlines in their own calendar app. It's important to note that while students are expected to record their homework tasks in their planner, sharing the Google Classroom calendar with parents can provide an additional layer of support.

As the school continues to expand its use of Google Classroom, students may be asked to submit work and receive feedback online. However, the school recognizes the importance of developing traditional skills such as writing, art, and music. Therefore, many assignments may still need to be submitted physically, and teachers will inform students of the required format for each assignment.
