#### Red Lanyard - Compulsory requirement

## Consultation for Parents: Voting on Transition to Vertical Tutoring for Form Time

Dear Parents and Guardians,

As part of our ongoing efforts to enhance our educational approach, we are considering transitioning to a Vertical Tutoring system for form time (7-7:10am) at our school. Vertical tutoring involves grouping students from different year groups together for mentoring, support, and collaborative learning, as opposed to the traditional system, where students are typically grouped by age during form time. We believe this change has the potential to strengthen our community, provide new learning opportunities, and support personal growth for all students.

However, before making any final decisions, we want to hear from you. This consultation is designed to provide you with key information, explain the potential benefits and challenges, and allow you to vote on whether or not we should move forward with the change to vertical tutoring.

#### What is Vertical Tutoring?

Vertical tutoring is a system where students from different year groups (for example, Year 7, Year 8, Year 9, etc.) are grouped together for form time only. This will allow older students to mentor and support younger students and vice versa, fostering an environment of peer learning, guidance, and collaboration.

#### **Key Benefits of Vertical Tutoring**

1. Enhanced Peer Relationships and School Community

Vertical tutoring breaks down barriers between different age groups,
encouraging cross-year group friendships, improving social integration, and
strengthening the sense of community within the school.





• 2. Opportunities for Peer Mentorship

Older students can serve as mentors to younger students, helping with academic challenges and personal development and offering guidance based on their own experiences. Younger students benefit from these interactions by learning new strategies, gaining confidence, and having positive role models.

• 3. Personalized Support and Growth

Vertical tutoring enables more tailored support, as students can ask questions and receive advice from both peers and staff members. The opportunity for students to learn from those in different year groups can promote diverse perspectives and skills.

• 4. Development of Leadership Skills

Older students, in particular, will have the chance to develop their leadership and communication skills as they take on the role of mentor, improving their confidence and sense of responsibility.

How Will the System Work?

Groupings: Students will be grouped in small, mixed-year groups that meet regularly for tutor time in the morning. These groups will be designed to foster positive interactions and learning opportunities across ages.

Focus Areas: Sessions will focus on academic support, personal development, and building relationships. Older students will be encouraged to mentor and provide guidance, while younger students will receive support and the chance to ask questions in a safe, welcoming space.

Staff Support: Teachers and tutors will oversee the vertical tutoring groups to ensure that students are engaged and supported effectively during each session.





#### What Do We Need From You?

We recognise that this change may raise questions or concerns. As such, we are requesting your input on whether you support the transition to vertical tutoring. Your feedback is crucial in helping us make an informed decision that best serves our students and school community.

Please review the details provided, and vote on whether you support the move to vertical tutoring. We welcome any additional comments or questions you may have, and we will hold a meeting on Sunday 4th of May to discuss the proposal in more detail.

Please note that this change would not involve students being mixed by age for teaching and learning, students will still have all lessons as normal with students in their year group

- 1 May 2025 International Workers' Day, also known as May Day, is observed globally to honour workers' contributions and to advocate for labour rights and fair working conditions.








