MOBILE PHONES AND ELECTRONIC DEVICES AT DBS

Minimising Distractions, Enhancing Focus

To support a focused and distraction-free learning environment, as has previously been communicated, Doha British School has implemented a clear policy on the use of mobile phones and electronic devices across all areas of the school premises.



Yondr Pouch Policy

All students are required to either:

- Secure their mobile phones in a Yondr pouch upon arrival, or
- Leave their devices at home.
- Exceptions are made only for medical reasons (e.g., continuous glucose monitors).

To ensure compliance, random checks—including bag and locker searches—will be conducted.

Procedures for Device Use

- Arrival and Departure: Students must lock/unlock their device at Reception each day.
- Early Dismissals or Returns: Devices may be unlocked at Reception when students leave and must be relocked upon return.



Consequences for Not Following the Policy

1st

Consequences:

- Device kept at Reception until the end of the day.
- Student receives a 20-minute reflection (C2).
- Parents are notified.

2nd

Consequences:

- Device confiscated.
- One-day internal reflection (C3).
- Phone returned only to a parent/guardian.
- Parents informed via phone/email.

3rd

- Device confiscated.
- Three-day suspension.
- Phone returned to parent following a meeting.

4th

Consequences:

- Device confiscated.
- Five-day suspension.
- Parents requested to find an alternative school for the following academic year.
- Phone only returned after a parent meeting.

If a student refuses to hand over a device, they will be placed in internal reflection. Note: From the third incident, a parent meeting is required before the phone is returned.

Emergency Contact

If needed, students may contact parents via the school reception phone with approval from senior staff.

Final Authority

Any disputes regarding this policy will be resolved at the discretion of the Principal or a designated school leader.





Red Lanyard - Compulsory requirement

Thank you for ensuring that you enter the school premises with a red lanyard, or by showing appropriate identification to obtain a yellow visitor's lanyard. I would like to remind you that this policy is in place to ensure the safety and security of all our community members, especially our children, by ensuring that all personnel on site are authorised.

Please note the following:

 To avoid being stopped by security, ensure your lanyard is visible upon entry and while you remain on the premises.



- If you do not have a red lanyard for any reason, one can be obtained from the reception desk.
- If you have applied for a red lanyard but are still awaiting your card, you
 may collect a red lanyard from reception, and later pick up your card once it
 is ready.
- If you have not yet applied for a red lanyard, we advise you to do so at the reception desk. Otherwise, you will need to show ID and collect a yellow lanyard each time you enter.
- Please remember that staff on duty are carrying out their responsibilities if they ask you to show your lanyards or ID cards. Please be polite and courteous when engaging in any discussions.
- Despite security and support staff knowing you, there is no guarantee that all staff on site are familiar with you, particularly after you have dropped off your child. Therefore, please keep your lanyards visible at all times.

A huge thank you to the primary team for welcoming them so warmly – and well done to all the students who took part with such enthusiasm!
















SCIENCE HIGHLIGHTS


KS4 WORKING SCIENTIFICALLY






